An indirect question is not a question at all. In a direct question, the auxiliary verb comes before the
subject. However, in an indirect question, the auxiliary verb comes after the subject. What's more, an
indirect question ends with a full stop, not a question mark.

Read the following sentences.

Direct question: Where are you going?

Indirect question: I want to know where you are going. (NOT I want to know where are you going?)

Direct question: When do you intend to leave?

Indirect question: *I want to know when you intend to leave.* (NOT I want to know when do you intend to leave?)
