Time expressions and the tenses used with them

Time expressions indicate the tense. Here is a quick overview of the different time expressions and the tenses used with them.

Usually, never, generally, always, seldom, often - simple present tense

At present, now, at the moment - the present continuous tense

Already, just, yet - present perfect tense

Since, for - present perfect or present perfect continuous tense

Yesterday, last week, two hours ago etc - simple past

Tomorrow, next week, next year - simple future
